

Prevent pipe damage from tree roots



A growing problem

Trees versus pipes

Believe it or not, tree roots are responsible for the majority of Melbourne's sewer and drain blockages. This happens mostly at residential properties, but tree roots can also damage buildings, footpaths, fences and water pipes.

Tree roots seek out water, and will find their way into water pipes and sewer pipes to get to it. Once a tree root has got into a pipe, they can spread long distances and grow into a big mass causing blockages, leaks, and damage.

For property owners, who are responsible for the pipes and plumbing fixtures up to the connection with South East Water's sewer branch, a blocked or damaged pipe can be costly and messy to fix.

So when it comes to planting trees on your property, it helps to know which varieties you might want to avoid.


What you should know

Before planting a tree, contact <u>Before You Dig</u> <u>Australia (BYDA)</u> for a free report on the location of different underground pipes and cables in your area. And get in touch with us to purchase a property sewerage plan which will show you where the sewerage pipes are on your property.

If you're wanting to plant a tree in the nature strip, you need to first gain permission from your local council, and then contact BYDA.

You may also want to reach out to your local nursery for advice. They should be able to help you with choosing the right tree or shrub to work in the space you have available, while avoiding those that may affect pipes, power lines, fencing, paving or drains, both now and when the tree is fully matured.

There are no hard and fast rules, however the following pages list some tree varieties to avoid planting within 2 and 3.5 metres of pipes to help prevent future damage and blockages.



Problem plant varieties to avoid within 2 metres of pipes

Please note that this list is intended as a helpful guide but does not claim to be comprehensive. If any plant on your property interferes with our water or sewer main we have the legal right to remove it under the *Water Act 1989.*
